They are both in Class Two.

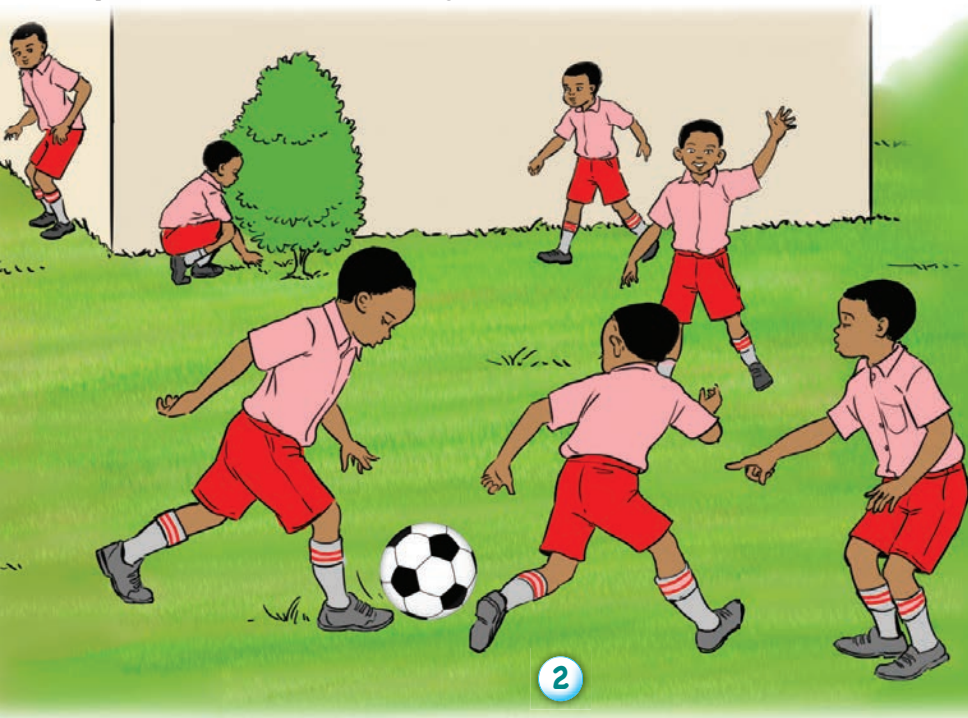
One day at break time, the children were playing in the field.

He pointed to his eye.

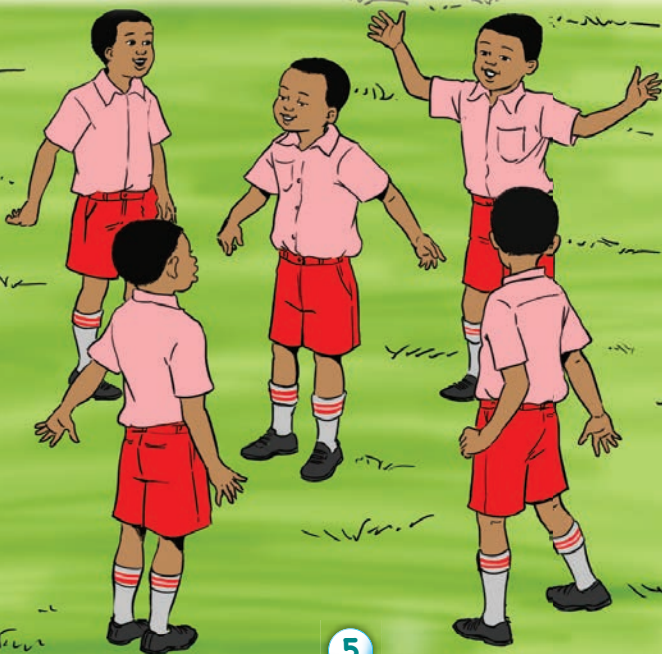
The new leader got to the center of the circle.

Teacher Asha and the other boys laughed.

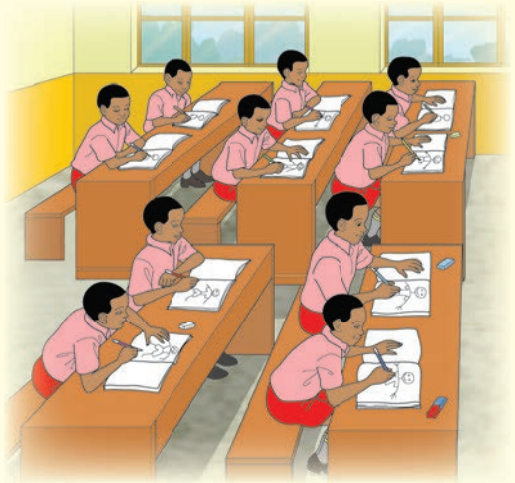
“Your heart is not missing,” she said.
