

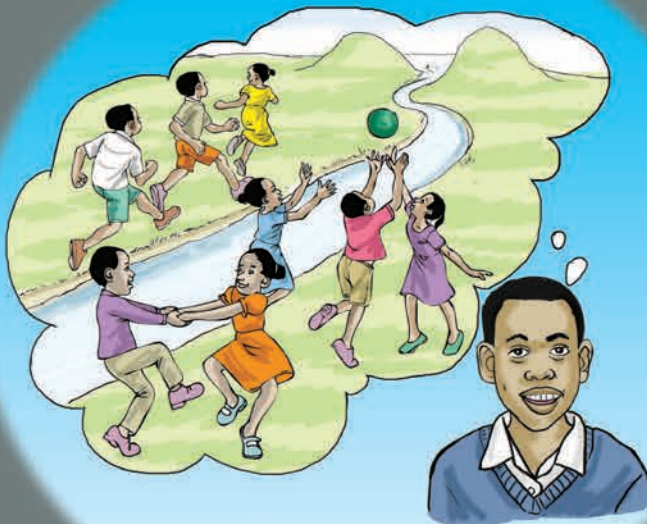

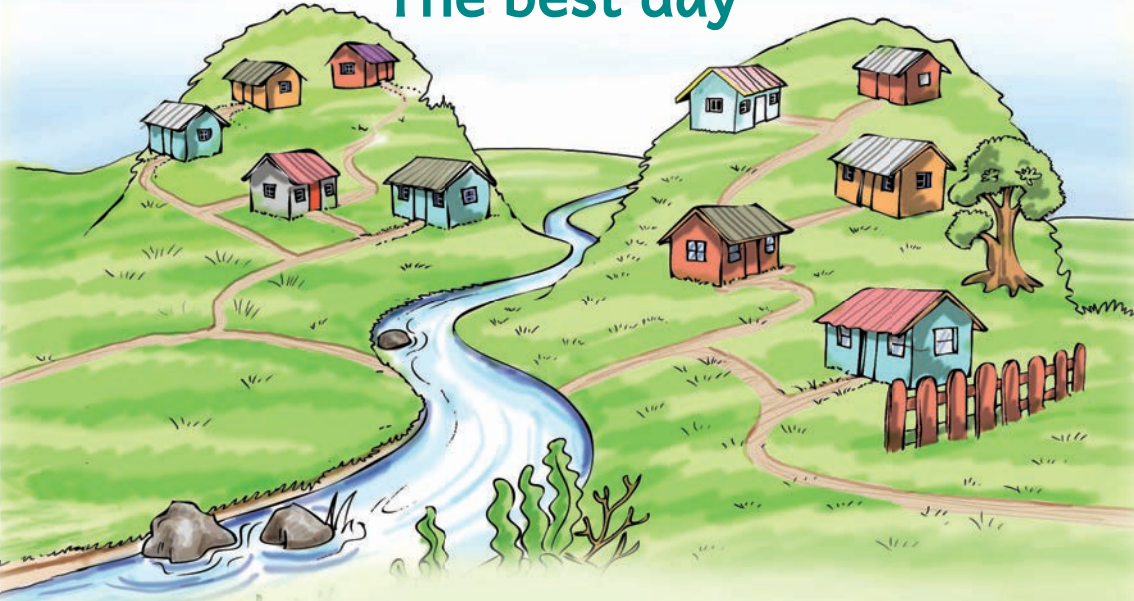

They all drank water from River Pala.

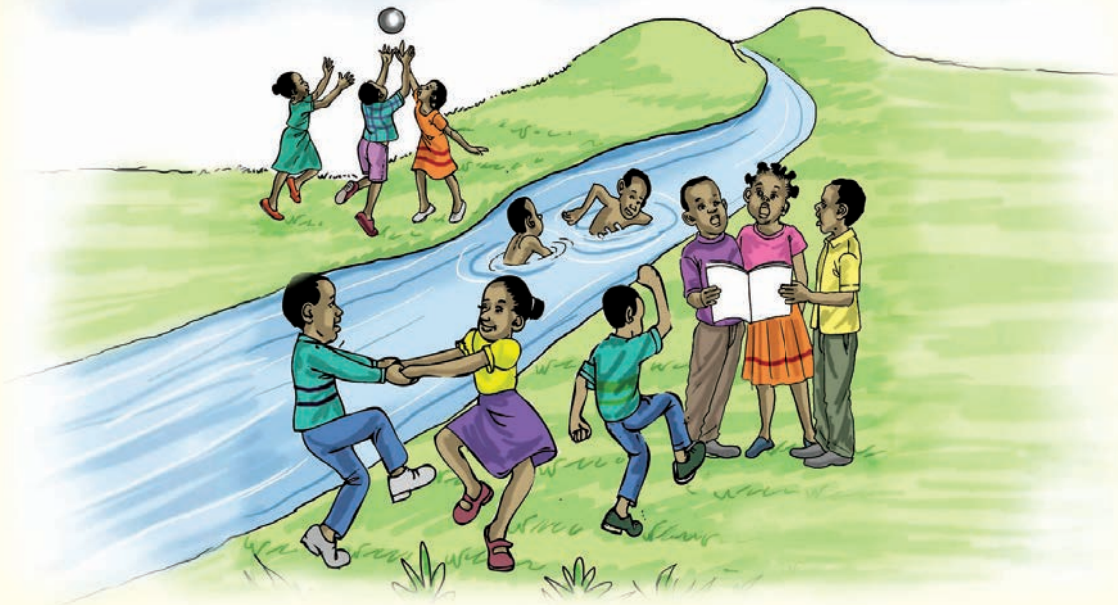
The children looked after the animals together.

It always sang in the evening.

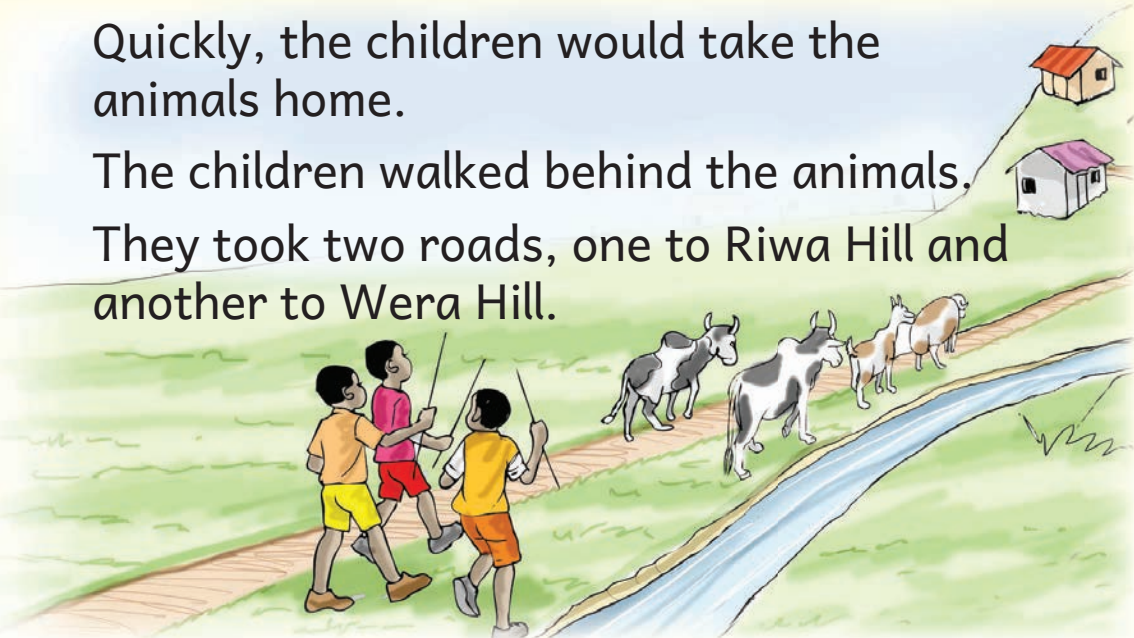
The children knew the song.

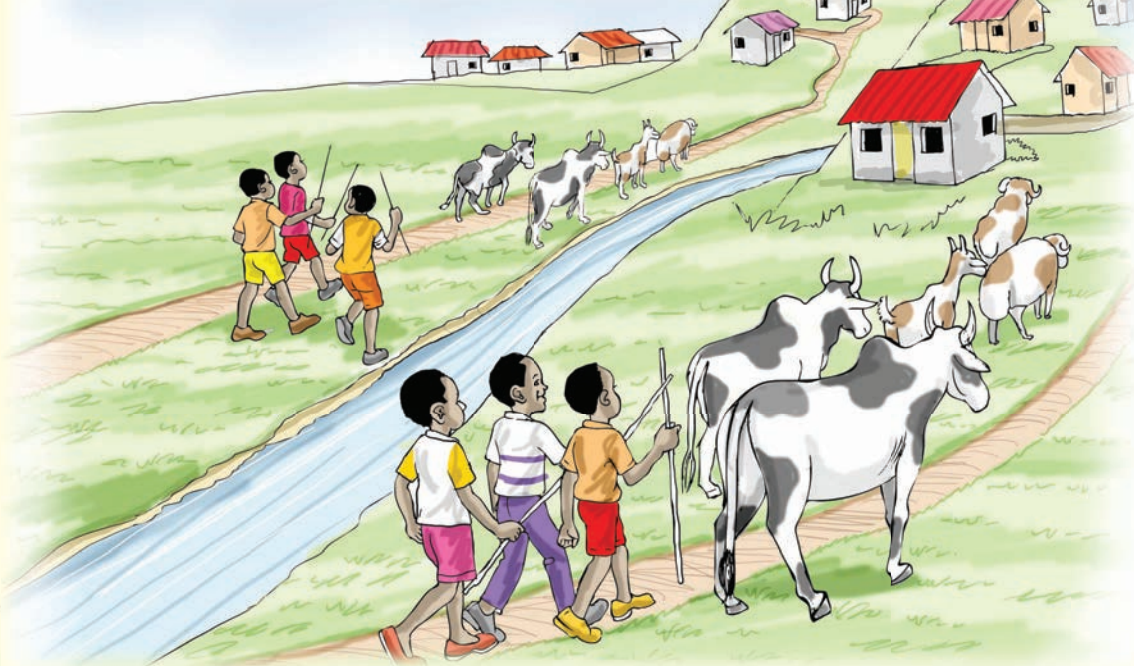
It said, "The hyena will eat. Take the animals home!"

At times, the grass on the hills dried.

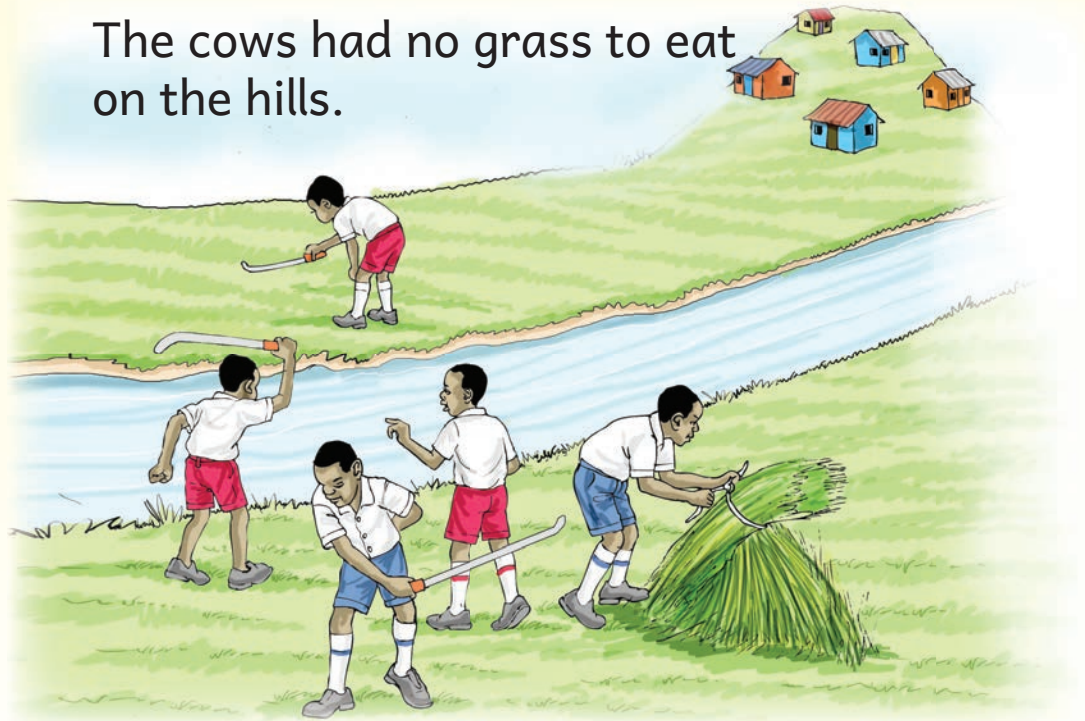
One day, boys from Riwa and Wera Primary schools met.

A pupil from Wera said, “I like Thursday a little.

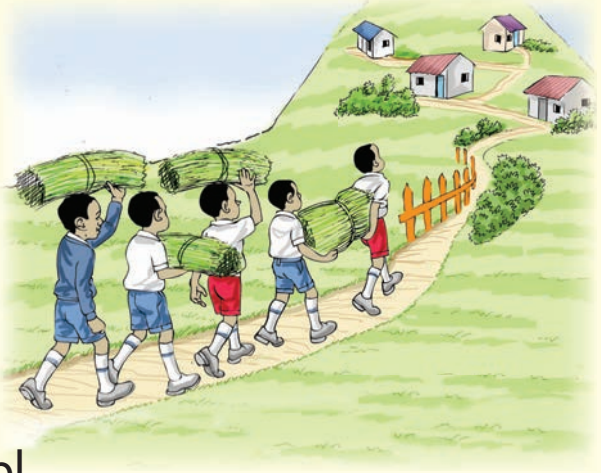
It is close to Saturday and Sunday.”
